JUNIOR/SENIOR YEAR CHECKLIST

SPRING SEMESTER JUNIOR YEAR

- ☐ Explore summer activities that support your goals
- □ Visit college campuses over Spring Break (virtual tours and fairs available on colleges' websites)
- Make sure you are registered for the correct courses based on graduation and specific college requirements. DO NOT overload yourself!
- □ Take the SAT/ACT. [Subject Test(s) if needed.]
- ☐ Register with the NCAA if pursuing an athletic scholarship at a Division 1 or 2 institution. Complete application at www.ncaa.org and send transcripts and test scores to NCAA.
- If applying to colleges over the summer or in early August, request an official final transcript before end of school year.
- ☐ To explore your strengths and likes for a major and career, take the Strengths Explorer and Career Interest Profiler in Naviance under the Careers tab.
- ☐ Also utilize the Roadtrip Nation Feature in Naviance under Careers to explore what careers interests.

SUMMER BEFORE SENIOR YEAR

- ☐ Engage in activities that enhance your college and scholarship applications.
- □ Narrow down your college list.
- ☐ Start working on admissions essays.

FALL SEMESTER SENIOR YEAR

- ☐ Take charge in your extracurricular activities and continue to demonstrate leadership.
- □ Ask teachers and counselors for recommendations and provide them with materials and deadlines . Give all parties 10 school days to complete recommendations and forms.
- □ Submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) which becomes available in December (the earlier, the better) at fafsa.ed.gov.
- ☐ Parents should prepare to complete the CSS/Profile® for financial aid as early as November if you plan on applying to private colleges.
- □ Order and send official ACT or SAT scores and your high school transcript to all the colleges you apply to.
- □ Submit all application materials before deadlines.
- ☐ Confirm materials have been received by colleges, including letters of recommendations and official scores by logging into the college's admissions portal.

SPRING SEMESTER SENIOR YEAR

- ☐ Apply to any additional colleges you're still considering.
- ☐ Continue to keep up your grades as you wait to hear decisions from schools.
- ☐ Apply for housing.
- □ Visit colleges to which you've been accepted if you still need help making a decision.
- ☐ Check financial aid award letters in April and consider appealing if you have not been awarded a fair amount by a particular college.
- Decide on a college and send the Enrollment Confirmation Docs to the college by the date specified.

COLLEGE ADMISSION TESTING

Typically most colleges require standardized test scores. SAT or ACT are both accepted at majority of the colleges. Some colleges require the SAT subject test/s in addition to the SAT or ACT. <u>Use IA Code 110387 when registering to ensure that your score is sent to Innovation Academy</u>. SAT and ACT Fee waivers are available for qualified students.

TEST PREPARATION

COLLEGE ADMISSIONS: WHAT IS RIGHT FOR ME?

Rolling Cycle: admissions decisions are usually made within 6 weeks of submitting the application. No specific deadlines.

Early Action/Admission/Notification: receive a decision earlier than the standard response date BUT are NOT required to accept the admission offer or make a deposit prior to May 1.

Early Decision: BINDING CONTRACT—commit to enroll at the college if admitted and offered a satisfactory financial aid package. Application deadlines are usually in November to December with a mid-to-late December notification. You can only apply to one Early Decision school.

Regular Decision: receive a decision at the standard response date.

A NOTE ON ATHLETICS

- Seniors must have 17.0 credits when school starts in August to be eligible for fall sports, per GHSA rules.
- There are specific requirements for each Division if you hope to be NCAA eligible in college –

SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

HOPE, Zell Miller, HOPE Grant and Zell Miller Grant

Student Social Security Number needs to be filed with the school

Georgia's HOPE Scholarship is available to Georgia residents who have demonstrated academic achievement. The scholarship provides money to assist students with their educational costs of attending a HOPE eligible college in Georgia. See details on eligibility and award amounts **www.gafutures.org.**

HOPE Scholarship

3.0 HOPE GPA at the time of graduation as calculated by GAFutures . *GPA is not rounded up. Four Rigor courses required.* Awards portion of standard tuition.

Zell Miller Scholarship

3.7 HOPE GPA and a 1200 (CR+M) on the SAT on a single testing or 26 Composite on the ACT. *Four Rigor courses required.* Awards full standard rate of tuition.

HOPE Grant and Zell Miller Grant-

No high school GPA requirement. This program is for students seeking a technical certificate or diploma.

A student's High School HOPE Scholarship GPA Calculation is not the same as his or her high school GPA. Grades earned in 9th through 12th grade in core content areas along with some career tech courses are included and converted to a 4.0 scale. Courses taken in middle school for high school credit are not included in GPA and do not count toward rigor requirements. *The 7 points awarded for honors, AP and college courses are removed. *Numeric grades are converted to a 4.0 scale.

*For AP and college courses where the unweighted grade is a "B" or 3.0 or a "C" or 2.0 points, an additional 0.5 weight is added.

FAFSA

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the form that colleges use to award financial aid. Submitting it is your key to accessing grants, scholarships, work-study programs and student loans. <u>FAFSA OPENS IN DECEMBER</u> and must be completed each year. <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u>

CSS profile

The CSS PROFILE is required by many private colleges and universities to determine your eligibility for non-government financial aid, such as the institution's own grants, loans and scholarships.

FAQ

Q: Do I have to pay for scholarship searches? How can I search for scholarships?

Q: How do I search for merit aid?

A: Each college will list their scholarship on their Financial Aid or Scholarship page. Scholarship deadlines are usually earlier than regular admissions deadlines. Check with each college to see their process for applying and their deadline. Also check

COLLEGE SELECTION PROCESS

1. Begin by searching colleges that interest you. Some factors to consider include Size, Location, Cost of Attendance, Major, Student Life, etc. Then, divide your choices into three categories by your chance of being admitted.

Applying to at least two schools in each category will help you avoid aiming your sights too low and missing out on a chance to get into a competitive program or aiming too high and not getting in anywhere at all. Remember to apply to four or more colleges minimum. *Sometimes safety schools can end up offering a hefty scholarship or acceptance into the Honors Program*.

- 2. Use Naviance to search colleges and save the ones of interest in your Naviance account. Use the Super Match feature under Finding a College Fit. It is the recommended college search option. (Fairtest.org is a site that lists colleges that are test optional.)
- 3. To explore your strengths and likes for a major and career, take the Strengths Explorer and Career Interest Profiler in Naviance under the Careers tab.

The GPA Mystery

Each college calculates GPAs differently. We encourage students to contact colleges to ask which method of GPA calculation they utilize. Students should always report their official weighted or unweighted numeric average found on their transcript.

DO NOT recalculate your GPA unless directed by a college.

Cumulative GPA

All classes listed on your high school transcript

Core GPA

Only grades from English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and World Language areas are included

Numeric Average

Fulton County calculates a numeric average out of 100 and provides a weighted and unweighted GPA (family choice to select one suited to college)

Rank

IA does not rank students

COLLEGE APPLICATION PROCESS

STEP 1: SUBMIT APPLICATION

Most colleges use the Common App, Black Common App, or Coalition App (SCOIR) as their application platform. Some still use their own application systems found on their websites. Some schools in the University System of Georgia offer an application process through the GAFutures.org website. Note any deadlines imposed by the college and plan ahead by four weeks or earlier.

STEP 2: SEND SAT/ACT SCORES

Order your SAT/ACT scores directly from the testing agency. **Plan ahead!** This can take a few weeks. For the SAT, visit <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>; ACT visit <u>www.act.org</u>.

STEP 3: TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS

If you are using Common App, Black Common App, or Coalition App, you do not need to request your transcript. Your counselor will receive a notification to upload your transcript. If you are applying through GAFutures, you can request your transcript directly through GAFutures. For any other official transcript requests, use ScribOrder. Go to https://www.counseling.fcsia.com/request-for-records for more information. **Students may request official transcripts for college or scholarship opportunities after Labor Day.** Transcripts need to be updated with summer classes.

STEP 4: REQUEST RECOMMENDATIONS (if required)

If the college you applied to requires a recommendation, adhere to the guidelines established by the college. Ask the teacher if s/he is able to write a recommendation for you. Teacher and counselor requests submitted through Common App generate an email that is sent to the recommender. Be sure to submit this request four weeks in advance. If **the recommendation must be mailed,** provide your teacher with a pre-stamped, pre-addressed envelope and allow at least <u>four weeks</u> notice ahead of deadlines.

Complete the About Me form on our website so teachers and counselors will have resume information about you.
